What's Included in the OLLI Spring 2026 Catalog

At the time of printing, the information included in the spring catalog was current and accurate. Any updates to the listed information (changes, additions, cancellations, etc.) will be announced in OLLI's weekly newsletter, *Connections*, and online entries of courses and programs will be corrected to reflect the new information.

OLLI courses are typically 5-6 weeks long and meet once a week for 90 minutes. Courses explore a wide range of topics and are offered both in-person and online via Zoom. Class sessions are offered Monday-Saturday with varying times throughout the day, including some evening courses.

OLLI Talks are one-time lectures, presentations, or workshops typically held over the noon hour.

Shared Interest Groups (SIGs) are created around a common interest and like to meet outside the normal OLLI class environment to discuss and enjoy this mutual interest. Each group is different depending on

its focus, and all provide interesting lifelong learning opportunities as well as fun social experiences.

Theatre Outings. OLLI members enjoy discounted tickets to select theatre performances in the Boston area. The Theatre Committee works with various production companies to select shows and dates for OLLI to attend as a group.

Travel. Members enjoy fun and educational day trips as well as overnight travel (both domestic and international). Volunteers put together trip itineraries and promote them to OLLI members at discounted prices.

Introduction to Traditional Yang Style Tai Chi

Students will acquire a comprehensive understanding of Yang-style Tai Chi, the most widely practiced and popular style of Tai Chi, commonly referred to as “meditation in motion.” The Yang postures are characterized by their relaxed, expansive, simple, precise, centrally aligned, and harmoniously combined nature, incorporating both hard and soft elements. These postures can be positioned at high, middle, or low stances, accommodating individual preferences. This flexibility renders the Yang form suitable for health preservation and enhancement, thereby augmenting strength, balance, and overall fitness. Each class commences with warm-up exercises designed to promote softness, relaxation, and looseness. We will delve into fundamental principles and concepts, fostering body awareness, balance, and meditation.

Facilitators: John “Jack” Walsh, a retired U.S. official, studied the Yang style Tai Chi hand and sword forms under Master Liang Yin Zhao at Murray Hill Chinese School in New Jersey from 2003 to 2018. After retirement, he dedicated himself to studying Traditional Yang Tai Chi under Master Huan Zhang (former OLLI instructor) and Sifu David Watts. Jack also studied Sun style Tai Chi and received two Instructor Certifications for Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention from Dr. Paul Lam. Since April 2024, he has taught Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention for Brigham and Women’s Hospital at the Boston Public Library. In May 2025, Master Zhang conferred upon him an Instructor Certification for Traditional Yang Tai Chi, and he is an assistant instructor at Tong Hua Men School of Kung Fu and Tai Chi Chuan in Cambridge. Jack is currently an instructor at OLLI.

Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention

Developed by Dr. Paul Lam and the Tai Chi for Health Institute, this comprehensive program, rooted in the Sun style of Tai Chi, provides an in-depth understanding of its distinctive characteristics. This program offers an effective exercise regimen promoting holistic well-being, with customizable exertion levels for individuals of varying abilities, including young seniors. It incorporates unique qigong practices and a higher stance, making the learning process engaging and enjoyable. The program offers numerous health benefits, including arthritis symptom relief, reduced pain, improved balance, fall risk reduction, flexibility, strength, cardiovascular fitness, immune system support, and tranquility. Arthritis foundations and the CDC recommend these evidence-based exercises. Each class begins with warm-up exercises to foster softness, relaxation, and looseness, followed by learning the fundamental Tai Chi postures, principles and concepts.

Quantum Experiments for Everyone

The quantum world can seem mysterious, but it’s all around us! Come explore simple experiments that don’t require any special background but will help you see and appreciate the wonders of quantum mechanics. Labs will be set up for you, so you only have to do the fun stuff! We’ll talk about how what we see connects to core ideas of physics, how the discoveries played out historically, and how these principles relate to current research in quantum computing and quantum technologies.

Facilitator: Mary Fries is a UMB physics graduate student with an interest in quantum education and the foundations of quantum mechanics. Fries is also curriculum designer with over a decade and a half of experience developing math and computer science classroom materials and teacher professional development programs.

Adaptability: The Art and Science of Staying Resilient, Creative and Flexible

Adaptability, a natural, lifelong process, is life's master skill — from the way a tree bends in the wind to the way humans reinvent themselves through change. In this course we explore how all living things adapt, how adaptability evolves across the lifespan, how creativity and resilience fuel adaptability and how we can consciously cultivate it as an art form for lifelong wellbeing physically, mentally and emotionally. We will learn from nature, psychology, and one another, examine our ability to adjust to change, recover from challenges, and, through classroom lectures, discussions, and interactive exercises, find innovative ways forward while practicing resilience and creativity.

Facilitator: Myrna Finn is a professor emerita at Salem State University where she taught courses in all aspects of oral communication. With her motto "you're never too old to learn something new," she is a life-long learner always looking to expand her horizons and understanding and have fun in the process.

Autism Spectrum Disorders: Fact or Fantasy?

This course, designed for adults, offers a foundational overview of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), focusing on characteristics, communication styles, and practical strategies for fostering positive interactions and support. Participants will explore topics such as understanding social cues and communication challenges, recognizing sensory issues, and navigating the nuances of relationships and lifetime experiences in adulthood. The class emphasizes a neurodiversity-affirming approach, promoting empathy, acceptance, and effective communication with persons with autism and their caretakers. The goal is to equip adults with the knowledge and skills to understand autism, its challenges and strengths, as well as a basic understanding of contemporary issues regarding autism in the world today.

Facilitator: Dr. Susan Gurry has been working in the field of Autism Spectrum Disorders since 1975. She retired from the Cambridge Public Schools in 2018 and was the Program Director for Severe Special Needs at Lesley University Division of Graduate Programs for 20+ years. She has been interested in ASD since 1975 and currently Life Coaches adults on the spectrum and consults to families.

Is Liberation Theology Dead?

What is liberation theology? Why is it controversial? This course explores this combination of spirituality and social activism, which is centered on the belief that one cannot separate religious faith from the struggle for a just society. We will examine the history of this belief system, a case study showing its impact on social movements in Brazil, and debates about it. The last include the question of whether it is dying or is still relevant and whether it is more Marxist than religious. Except for some informational presentations, the course will be interactive.

Facilitator: Madeleine Cousineau is a retired sociology professor who has written books and articles based on years of research on religion and social activism in Latin America. She taught full-time at Mount Ida College and part-time at UMass Boston, gave guest lectures in three countries, and received a Fulbright for Brazil.

A New Look at the Bible - Part II

Ever wanted to learn more about the Bible, but don't know how to begin? Whether Christian, Jewish, Muslim, or otherwise, the Bible is still a relevant text to the 21st century global citizen due to its history and influence. Even after teaching its contents to high school students for 40 years, Sharon Bildeau still thinks so! Join this class to dive into the Books of Joshua, Judges and Ruth. These are the books that continue the biblical story of the liberation from slavery in Egypt and the wilderness years, into "the promised land." We will get to know the stories in all their unapologetic, ancient detail. We will also apply literary, historical critical and varied theological perspectives to glean an appreciation of the meaning, purpose and craft of the texts. It is not necessary to have attended the Fall (2025) session of this course.

Facilitator: Sharon Bilodeau is a retired High School theology teacher who loved exploring Scripture, ethics, service and justice issues with students at BC High. Sharon is part of a Muslim, Jewish, and Christian book group called "The Daughters of Abraham". She brings an interfaith approach to Scripture study. She is delighted to have the opportunity to explore Biblical studies with OLLI members at UMass.

Unlock the Power of Your Life Story

Everyone has stories worth telling—but many of us don't know where to begin. In this four-week interactive workshop, participants will use story-sparking techniques to uncover vivid memories and meaningful moments from their lives. Each session centers on a life theme—Turning Points, Family, and Aspirations—and includes guided prompts, brief writing, and supportive sharing. Adapted for OLLI from the Guided Autobiography (GAB) method developed by Dr. James Birren, this course emphasizes in-class reflection, engagement, and community. With a small group of up to eight participants, everyone will have time to write, read aloud, and receive affirmative feedback.

Facilitator: Angela Lifsey is an Executive Coach, Facilitator, and Certified Guided Autobiography Instructor who helps people explore meaning and purpose through coaching and storytelling. A former Harvard University program director, she contributed a chapter on Guided Autobiography to *The Next Chapter is Yours* (2025), an anthology on reinvention.

The Media Mirage

In this 5-week course we will explore the rapidly changing landscape of American news media as guide to understanding the chaotic cultural and political changes we are living through. Using *The Siren's Call: How Attention Became the World's Most Endangered Resource* by MSNBC host Chris Hayes as our guide, we will trace the concurrent explosion of information available and the destabilizing distraction we all experience in trying to make sense of it all. Along the way we will also consider the recent works of authors such as Timothy Snyder and Ta-Nehisi Coates.

Facilitator: Joshua Frank provides Adult Education in Racial Equity and American History. He worked as an educator for twenty-eight years in Massachusetts public schools. He completed his undergraduate education at UMass/Amherst and Master's degrees from UMass/Boston and the Harvard Graduate School of Education.

Artists and Inspiration

What do artists find their inspiration? Throughout time, artists have looked to current events, the work of fellow contemporary artists, as well as historical time periods to find inspiration for their art. Artists bring in references from nature, the industrial world, religious traditions, and everything in between, when creating art and responding to the world around them. This course will explore the many ways in which artists spark their creativity, and influence those around them. Session topics will include: the art historical inspirations that fuel contemporary Italian fashions in the special exhibition Renaissance to Runway: The Enduring Italian Houses; the artistic exchange between Impressionist artists Édouard Manet and Berthe Morisot in the special exhibition Manet & Morisot; the global histories that have inspired contemporary artist Martin Puryear's practice in the special exhibition Martin Puryear: Nexus; as well as various artistic influences across the museum's exhibitions and permanent collection.

Facilitator: Arielle Levine of the Cleveland Museum of Art teaches students all around the world during video conferences in the museum's Distance Learning Program. She has a degree in art history from Case Western Reserve University and has been with the museum's education department for over 15 years.

The Bauhaus: History of the World's Most Influential Art School

The Bauhaus existed between 1919 and 1933. In this brief time, it revolutionized art instruction, and the world of design. Its instructors were a who's who of famous artists such as Paul Klee, Vasily Kandinsky and Joseph Albers. We will learn about the school's founding, its methods and the legacy it has left us.

Facilitator: David Pogue is a veteran educator with over thirty years of experience. His main areas of interest are music, art, literature, history, and evolutionary psychology.

The World of Musical Satire

This course explores music which uses one of the oldest forms of humor: satire, which is a way to set boundaries of behavior as well as chide malefactors without violence. Adding music seems to make it more powerful; in early Germanic and Celtic societies, people who were mocked in songs would break out in boils and even commit suicide. This multimedia course explores the art of musical satire in a variety of genres and eras, especially America since 1950. No background in music is necessary; in fact, because satire is often dependent on social and historical events, this course is as much cultural history as musicology. However, while words are preeminent in musical satire, we’ll also discuss the music and its interactions with lyrics. But please – no students who are prone to boils.

Facilitator: David Misch is a former stand-up comic, screenwriter (*Mork and Mindy, Saturday Night Live, The Muppets Take Manhattan*), author (*Funny: The Book*), teacher (USC and UCLA) and lecturer at Yale, Columbia, Oxford, the Smithsonian, 92Y (NYC), Austin Film Festival, and more than 30 lifelong learning programs around the country. Ever wanted to learn Arabic? This beginner-friendly multi-week course introduces the basics of the Arabic language through greetings, everyday expressions, and simple conversations. Participants will also explore cultural traditions, food, and customs from Arabic-speaking countries. Designed for absolute beginners, the course emphasizes interactive learning in a fun, relaxed environment. Each session combines language practice with cultural insights to build confidence and spark curiosity. By the end of the course, participants will be able to use simple Arabic expressions and gain a deeper appreciation of the culture that shapes the language.

Facilitator: Originally from Egypt, Nada Wanas is a native Arabic speaker passionate about sharing her language and culture. She introduces Arabic through conversation, traditions, and everyday expressions, making learning interactive and fun for adults eager to explore a new world of communication.

Sickness on the Steppes: Russian Hospital Stories

What was it like to be sick in Russia? As a health care system was created in the late 19th century, traditional folk medicines and European specialists were replaced by Russian doctors and hospitals. How did these doctors view the hospitals they worked in? How did patients experience them? The writer Anton Chekhov used his medical training to explore 19th century Russian hospitals, and the writer Aleksander Solzhenitsyn examined 20th century hospital experiences in his novel *The Cancer Ward*. How does illness relate to our basic humanity? How do healers and healing support our self-understanding in our most vulnerable moments?

Facilitator: Patricia Suhrcke received her PhD in Russian Literature from the University of Chicago. She previously taught Russian literature in translation in Chicago and Atlanta. She has been facilitating course for OLLI since 2016 and enjoys using her experience leading public dialogues to discuss the great Russian novels with interested readers.

The Early Cold War: From Bretton Woods to the JFK Administration

This course aims to unveil the dark, draconic dealings of the early Cold War with a particular focus on the role of the Central Intelligence Agency in shaping American interventionist policies worldwide. The topics covered will range from: U.S assistance of former Nazi personnel for their own gain, regime changes in countries such as The Philippines, Guatemala, & Iran, the earliest US involvement in Southeast Asia, obsession with Cuban regime change, and the domestic sociopolitical dynamics that made such foreign policy possible. Fundamentally the goal is to uncover and come to terms with the dark origins of American hegemony.

Facilitator: Liam Canady has an undergraduate degree in History with a minor in English, and is currently pursuing a Master's Degree at UMB in Public History, which is the process of translating academic research into forms that are easily digestible to the public. He became fascinated by Cold War history after reading David Talbot's *The Devil's Chessboard* and via follow-up research on the topic. Despite working at a historic Revolutionary War site (The Old North Church), he has always been fascinated by the Cold War era and continues to learn more every day.

When Ancestors Become Ghosts: Toni Morrison's *Beloved* as a Guide to Our Haunted Time

Participants analyze Toni Morrison's novel, *Beloved*, through lenses of history, psychoanalytic theory and our current tortured historical moment. Their insights help us understand impulses driving the current wave of book-banning and censorship, and the dangers of these impulses if they remain unexamined. The course title is an inversion of

psychoanalyst Hans Loewald's phrase "When Ghosts Become Ancestors." Instead of considering the growth that comes with recognition and acknowledgement, *Beloved* requires consideration of the consequences when we refuse to acknowledge and recognize our painful history.

Mayoral Elections in Boston, NYC & Hyderabad: Democracy & Minorities in the U.S. & India

This course offers a comparative exploration of mayoral elections in three distinct urban and political contexts: Boston, New York City, and Hyderabad. By examining how campaigns are crafted, how candidates position themselves, and which strategies lead to electoral success, the course highlights both the similarities and the unique political cultures shaping each city. The course pays particular attention to how minority communities—across race, caste, religion, class, gender, and migration histories—experience electoral politics differently. OLLI students will learn how political messaging is tailored to specific identities and how these identities shape political belonging and exclusion. Participants will critically reflect on how urban democracy operates in practice, how representation is negotiated, and how questions of power and access unfold in everyday governance. The course ultimately encourages learners to engage in broader debates on citizenship, political participation, and the prospects for inclusive democratic futures across global cities.

Facilitator: Mahesh Admankar is a PhD Candidate in Public Policy at UMass Boston. He earned his bachelor's degree in social science and master's in economics in India. Prior to pursuing his doctorate at UMB, Mahesh worked as an assistant professor of economics for four years in Hyderabad, India. His research interests are discrimination in the labor market, healthcare, education, climate justice, and social exclusion. He has taught several courses with OLLI.

The Scope of Presidential Power and the Role of the Courts: Navigating a Constitutional Crisis Under Trump 2.0

This course will examine the expansion of the power of the executive branch since Donald Trump took office in January, and the efficacy of the system of checks and balances envisioned by the framers of the Constitution. The course will first examine the Trump agenda from a political science perspective, noting parallels between the actions of the Trump administration and the erosion of democracy in other countries. The course will also provide a primer on presidential power under Article II of the Constitution, before turning to the Trump agenda in 2025, its precursors, and the legal theories underlying this agenda. The last classes will evaluate the role of the federal courts in placing limits

on excessive executive power and consider the nature and implications of a constitutional crisis. This is a repeat of the course taught in Fall 2025.

Facilitator: John S. Ross, III (Jack) earned an A.B. (history) degree from Yale University, a J.D. degree from the University of Virginia School of Law, and an LL.M. (taxation) degree from New York University School of Law. He practiced law for 20 years in Washington, D.C. and served as Adjunct Professor of Law at Washington and Lee University School of Law. Jack has taught numerous courses on constitutional law and other topics in the Worcester Institute for Senior Education at Assumption University and also facilitates the WISE Supreme Court Special Interest Group.

Can We Understand the Realities of U.S. Wars?

The United States has always interacted with foreign nations but only in the late 19th Century did it go abroad and begin to compete directly with other great powers and intervene violently in other nations. Since that time, the U.S. has been involved in many wars and smaller conflicts too numerous to enumerate. Are many Americans really aware of key realities of these numerous conflicts? What does the history of American foreign policy over the last century or so have to teach us about ourselves and our interactions with other peoples? Is it true that the United States has gone to war only reluctantly in opposition to the threats and aggressions of other states and individuals? Has Washington always fostered and promoted democracies and avoided conflict at all costs? Can we identify the underlying motivations and aims for specific policies carried out at different times? How may a critical examination of key episodes in the nation's foreign affairs from the late 19th Century to the present help us grasp the dangers of the modern era? This course will examine: the Annexation of Hawaii, the Spanish-American War, World War I and World War II, The Korean War, The Vietnam War, the Iraq War, and the Afghanistan War.

Tchaikovsky's Life and Music

Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840–1893) was Russia's most celebrated Romantic composer, whose emotionally powerful music bridged Western European traditions with Russian nationalism. Despite personal struggles, including his conflicted sexuality and bouts of depression, he created masterworks across multiple genres. His ballets, symphonies and concertos remain cornerstones of the classical repertoire. Tchaikovsky's gift for memorable melodies and dramatic orchestration made his music internationally beloved, establishing him as one of history's most influential composers whose works continue captivating audiences worldwide. In this course we'll listen to samples of his music in the context of what was happening in his life.

Facilitator: Steve Vorenberg earned a minor in music from University of New Mexico (BS/MA in Math), sang low bass in a classical music chorus, plays bassoon, and took piano lessons through college. He has a lifetime of attending concerts and recitals. He frequently listens to selections from his extensive classical music collection. We will examine five of the greatest trials that have occurred across the globe in a search for the truth, from Socrates to the O.J. Simpson trial. This journey will take us from ancient Athens, to the village of Salem, Massachusetts to modern Los Angeles, all examined from the lens of history, as well as through the perspective of the general public, judges, attorneys, and witnesses.

Facilitator: Justice Dennis J. Curran (Ret.) is a graduate of Boston Latin School, the University of Pennsylvania (B.A. and M.A.) and the University of Virginia Law School. He served as a Massachusetts trial judge for 15 years and has presided over 450 civil and criminal trials. Justice Curran has had a lifelong passion for history. He was elected a Fellow of the Massachusetts Historical Society, a member of the Board of Advisors of the Lincoln Forum and annually appears as a guest speaker at History Camp – Boston. Bridges or Barriers? How Infrastructures Shape Life In the US and Beyond

Infrastructures, often celebrated as symbols of modernity and national progress, are political. They tell stories about our aspirations, identities and what we collectively value in our societies. The course explores how big infrastructure projects from America's Interstate Highway System to China's Belt and Road Initiative in Pakistan reshape lives and displace communities. Through brief readings and engaging conversations, we will discuss the risks and rewards of "development" while connecting with familiar local histories such as Boston's Big Dig and Interstate 81. Together, we will reassess development goals by critically evaluating development discourses around large infrastructure projects.

Facilitator: Aamir Yaqoob is a PhD candidate in the Global Governance and Human Security program at the UMass Boston. His research examines narratives that project infrastructure-led development as a symbol of progress and a tool for diplomacy. His Global South experience adds a valuable comparative lens to the analysis.

Labor in the U.S.: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow

The course will look at the past, present, and future of unions and the world of work. In the late 19th century, unions established a presence in our political and economic life, facing constant violence and opposition. Workers organized on an unprecedented scale in the 1930s, leading to a long period of prosperity and labor peace in the post WWII era. Millions of Americans entered the middle class and established organized labor as a vehicle for social mobility. In the late 1970s and 1980s the business community, supported by an emerging right-wing political opposition, launched an assault on union influence and drove an agenda that diminished the percentage of American workers in unions from 35% to 10%. Globalization and the fissuring of the economy contributed to labor's decline as well. There are signs of creative forms of organizing in the changing workforce – among low- waged workers, women and workers of color, and workers in the new "innovation economy." The last two sessions will focus on the increasingly precarious conditions at work, the gig economy, some of the new forms of organizing, and whether organized labor can challenge fundamental issues of income inequality and global corporate power.

Facilitator: Mark Erlich has been a Wertheim Fellow at the Harvard Law School's Center for Labor & a Just Economy since retiring as head of the New England Regional Council of Carpenters in 2017. In addition to his long career in the trades and the labor movement, Mark has written and lectured extensively on labor issues. He is the author of *The Way We Build: Restoring Dignity to Construction Work* (2023) as well as two other books and dozens of essays, articles, and op-eds on labor history, politics, and contemporary union issues.

The goal of the course is not to persuade anyone to endorse or reject any view, but rather to explore what can be said for or against it in order to deepen our understanding of the position.

Facilitator: Mitchell Silver has taught philosophy at Tufts, Virginia Tech, and for 35 years at UMB till his retirement in 2017. He is the author of four books, as well as many academic and non-academic articles. His writing and teaching has often focused on political and ethical issues.

Country music, a key genre in American roots music, not only expresses the hardships of modern life, but also purposefully evokes an emotional response. Whether you are stuck in a troubled relationship, unemployed, homeless, spiritually bereft, or just lonesome, there's a country song for you. Each session of "Great Artists in American Roots Music" will involve a dynamic mix of lecture, performance and discussion. We will move beyond a historical survey of American roots music to focus on the individual stories and artistic developments of particular roots artists including Patsy Cline, Earl Scruggs, Willie Nelson and Brandi Carlile. We will also look at the role Roots music plays in various contemporary contexts, from community based activism to concert-hall spectacles. Literature is a conversation across time. A single poem is powerful, but what's remarkable is how poems speak to one another—answering, challenging, and transforming ideas. Allen Ginsberg's *Howl* would not exist without Walt Whitman's *Song of Myself*, and B.H. Fairchild's *Brazil* emerges from Ginsberg's shadow. In this course, we explore these dialogues: how poets respond across decades or centuries, creating new meaning through intertextual exchange. 

Book Group (full)

The discussion is often co-led between an OLLI member and a UMass Boston student. OLLI Course and Registration Information

Facilitators

OLLI course facilitators and OLLI Talk presenters share their areas of expertise with OLLI students on a volunteer basis. A course evaluation form is provided at the end of each course, and your constructive suggestions are welcomed by our facilitators. If you would like to complete an evaluation before the end of the course, please request a form from the OLLI office.



OLLI Scholars

This symbol indicates courses that are taught by UMass Boston graduate students under the OLLI Scholar program. The OLLI Curriculum Committee reviews proposals, interviews candidates, and mentors students from various graduate programs on campus. If accepted into the program, OLLI Scholars receive a stipend after successful completion of their courses. This intergenerational experience benefits both UMass graduate students and OLLI members.

Course Fees

- \$40 per course for OLLI Carte members, or
- Free for Full/Unlimited members.

Additional fees are sometimes required for courses that involve off-campus activities, special events, or a high amount of handout copying or instructional supplies.

Course fees are due a week after final course confirmations are released.

Course Cancellation

OLLI reserves the right to cancel a scheduled course because of low registration, non-availability of a facilitator, or any other unavoidable circumstance. Students will be notified as soon as possible.

Course Capacities

The maximum number of students registered for each course depends on the course topic (some may work best with a smaller class size) and the preference of the facilitator. If requests for a course exceed capacity, the registration priority system is used to determine who will be enrolled, based on the priorities set by each registrant.

Eligibility

Only current Full and OLLI Carte members are eligible to request and take courses. The General Membership category **does not** include the ability to take courses.

Course Registration Process

OLLI at UMass Boston uses a priority/lottery system to determine final course registrations. Full and OLLI Carte members must submit their course requests before the **Priority Registration Deadline of February 13** to be included in the lottery allocation process.

Please list your course choices in order of priority (highest priority = 1, and so on) on the Course Request Form or when using OLLI's online registration system. How does the lottery work? If demand exceeds the number of seats for a course, the computer assigns those seats by lottery based on your priority rankings.

Course requests received after the **February 13** deadline will be assigned based on availability on a first-come, first-served basis.

Paper Registration: Please complete the Course Request Form on page 32 and mail or fax to the OLLI office.

Online Registration: All current OLLI members have an account they can use for online course requests and registrations. Visit OLLI's online registration site where instructions are posted on how to use the system. Site address: <https://www.campusce.net/umb/category/category.aspx>

Course Confirmation: Students are not registered for courses until they receive a final confirmation. Confirmations will be emailed in late February. Please pay close attention to the details of the confirmation correspondence: "registered" means a student has been confirmed to attend the class; "not registered" means the course was oversubscribed, and the course request could not be accommodated; "registered not paid" indicates a student is registered for course but needs to pay the associated course fee.

Dropping or Adding Courses: Requests to drop a course or other OLLI program are handled by the OLLI office. Please email ollireg@gmail.com or call 617.287.7312 as soon as you determine that you will not be able to attend a program for which you are confirmed. If you would like to be placed on a waitlist for a course or program that is full, please contact the OLLI office, and you will be notified if a space becomes available.
